ISAIAH

Isaiah spoke for the Lord to the people of Judah during the reigns of four kings of Judah. Over this period of about forty years, the Assyrian empire was expanding. Nations joined together to fight Assyria, but Assyria finally conquered Israel and most other nearby countries. Thousands of people were led away as prisoners. And although the kingdom of Judah wasn't completely conquered, it had to pay heavy taxes.

The messages in this book can be divided into three parts. The first part is especially concerned about the Lord's holiness and his power as king of the whole earth. As a holy king, the Lord was angry about evil in Judah. Government officials were corrupt; violence and injustice were everywhere. The Lord said he was going to have Assyria and Babylonia punish the people of Judah and other nations. But the Lord offered his people hope for the future, if they turned back to him and trusted him to protect their nation.

In the second part the Lord spoke to people who had been punished. They were discouraged, and he offered them hope. But the Lord wanted them to understand that idols have no power, and that he alone is the true God. If the people of Israel turned back to him, then he would rescue them from Babylonia and the other nations where they had been scattered. They would return to their own land, and he would bless them and make them prosperous. The Lord was able to make this tremendous promise to his people because he created and rules the entire earth.

In the third part the Lord promises an especially bright future for those who are faithful to him. And in this section, people from all nations are included, not just the people of Judah. These promises are like windows that allow a glimpse into a future time when the Lord will create a new world full of joy and free from suffering.

Isa20: The LORD spoke through Isaiah: As Isaiah has gone stripped for three years, so Assyria will lead the Egyptians and Cushites captive.

Isa21: The oracle concerning the wilderness of the sea: I set a watchman. He said, "Fallen, fallen is Babylon!" The glory of Kedar will end.

Isa22: The oracle concerning the valley of vision: The LORD has taken away the covering of Judah. I will give to Eliakim the key of David.

Isa23: The oracle concerning Tyre: Wail, O ships, for Tyre is laid waste. The LORD has planned it. Tyre will be forgotten for seventy years.

GALATIANS

From the very beginning of this letter to the churches in the region of Galatia, Paul makes two things clear to his readers: he is a true apostle, and his message is the only true message. These statements were very important, because some people claimed that Paul was a false apostle with a false message.

Paul was indeed a true apostle, and his mission to the Gentiles was given to him by the Lord and approved by the apostles in Jerusalem. Paul had even corrected the apostle Peter, when he had stopped eating with Gentile followers who were not obeying the Law of Moses.

Faith is the only way to be saved. Paul insists that this was true already for Abraham, who had received God's promise by faith. And Paul leaves no doubt about what his own faith means to him.

Gal2: I went up to Jerusalem and saw the leaders. I opposed Cephas about circumcision. We are justified by faith in Christ and not by works.

Gal3: Those who are of faith are blessed with Abraham. Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law. In Christ you are all sons of God.

Gal4: God sent his Son for us to receive adoption. How can you turn back to worthless principles? You, like Isaac, are children of promise.

Gal5: Christ has set us free. Circumcision counts for nothing. Use your freedom to love one another. Walk by the Spirit and not the flesh

Gal6: Restore anyone caught in sin. Sow to the Spirit and reap eternal life. Let us not give up doing good. What counts is the new creation.

EPHESIANS

Paul begins his letter to the Christians in Ephesus with a powerful reminder of the main theme of his message. Christ died on the cross to set us free. But God raised Christ from death, and he now sits at God's right side in heaven, where he rules over this world. And he will rule over the future world as well.

Christ brought Jews and Gentiles together by "breaking down the wall of hatred" that separated them and he united them all as part of that holy temple where God's Spirit lives. This was according to God's eternal plan.

There is only one Lord, one Spirt of God, and one God, who is the Father of all people. This means that Christians must let the Spirit keep their hearts united, so they can live at peace with each other. The idea of all Christians being one with Christ is so central to this letter that it occurs twenty times. There is on faith and one baptism by which believers become one body.

Ephesus was a port city on the western shore of Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey). In Paul's time this was the fourth largest city in the Roman empire. It was also an ancient center of nature religion where the goddess Artemis was widely worshiped.

Paul lets the Ephesians know that much is expected of people who are called to a new life. Followers of the Lord are God's dear children, and they must do as God does. They used to live in the dark, but they must now live in the light an make their light shine.

Paul then teaches husbands and wives, children and parents, and slaves and masters how to live as Christians.

Getting to Know God Through His Book - 4 Questions - Ask...

Insight—what does the passage say? Paraphrase the main point(s) and the commands to follow, promises to claim, examples to follow (or avoid), etc.

Question—what don't I understand? Need to know more about? How does this passage make me feel?

Praise—what does this passage teach me about God? Turn what the passage says into praise for the Lord's goodness, power, holiness, wisdom, etc.

Apply—what is God saying to me from this passage? Confess how you have not followed it. Pray, asking God to help you obey. Get quiet and ask God to speak to you.

Journal—write out your prayers, thoughts, responses to God and His Word

HOW TO PRAY

Scripture is God speaking to us. Prayer is us speaking to and listening to God. Jesus gave us the model in the Lord's Prayer (Mt 6). Keep your relationship fresh with the Lord by both reading and praying - two way communication. Remember to look up like Jesus did when He prayed.

- 1. Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed by thy name focus on God, adore, praise, thank Him long to see His glory and honor.
- 2. Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done ask for what you know will please Him, pray back the Scripture that is His will.
- 3. Give us this day our daily bread ask for your needs and others to be met.

- 4. Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us ask for forgiveness, from God, and from others you may have hurt. Ask God to help you forgive and restore others too. Ask Him to get rid of bitterness and have love & compassion for those who have hurt you.
- And lead us not into temptation ask God to take over your day, protect you and others from evil.
- For thine is the kingdom, power & glory end by re-focusing on God, His kingdom, power, and glory!
- Listen ask God to speak to you by His Spirit always test what you hear by His Word.
 Pray the Blind Bartimaeus Prayer (Mark 10) Tell God what you feel, what you want, and ask God what you should do to get what you want (if what you want is right).
